



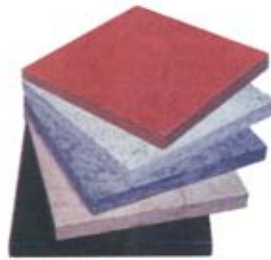

Science meets nature

Made in Italy, Okite is a quartz-based stone surfacing material that made its American debut at the April Kitchen & Bath Industry Show in Orlando. Okite looks like stone, but unlike marble, quartz or granite, does not require special care or maintenance and is virtually stain-proof. Okite retails for about \$10 to \$20 per square foot — about the same price as high-end granite — at TFI East (tficorp.com) in Lakewood, N.J.

Those citrus-y summertime cocktails just wouldn't taste right with juice from a bottle. That's why Williams-Sonoma's citrus presses (\$15 each) are a handy accompaniment for the summertime bar. They extract every bit of lemon or lime juice while separating out seeds, pulp and bits of peel. Made of coated cast aluminum, they won't rust or react with juices.
